Presidents Report

AGM

The AGM was very well attended this year. We are delighted that Rodney Collenette has agreed to become Vice-President. He has previously served on Council and the Finance Sub-Committee, and brings a wealth of experience in many fields. We also welcomed Sylvia Brouard as a new Ordinary member of Council. She is a Gold Accredited Guide, and we will be able to put her passion for Guernsey to good use. Nick Day was re-elected as a Council member. We were sorry to lose Mike Bairds and Geoff Allez, who were not eligible to stand again. We thank them for all their hard work and good advice over the 6 years they have served on Council.

This year we looked at subscription levels once again. In keeping with many organisations, it was recommended that we should increase some of our rates: the local single to rise to £22 pa, the local double and the family rate to rise to £30 pa; life membership will rise to £300 for local and £400 for double. The student rate would remain at £5 pa. The biggest change is that it was decided to merge single and double overseas rates into a new rate of £20 pa.

The meeting was followed by an extremely interesting illustrated short talk given by Jurat David Le Conte on the Society's 125-year history.

The legacy of Barbara Tostevin

We were delighted to receive £55,000 last month, from the estate of the late Barbara Tostevin. However, much to the regret of the entire Council, none of us knew her, apart from Edith Le Patourel who was at school with her but didn't know her well. Clearly either La Société meant a great deal to her, or it may just have been her way of ensuring that her bequest benefited her island. Either way we would be grateful for information about her from anyone who did know her well, so that we may ensure that the legacy is used in a way that she would have particularly enjoyed

Guernsey's Countryside: an Introduction to the History of the Rural Landscape by Richard Hocart

Council is extremely pleased to endorse the publication of a new book by Richard Hocart, which will trace the development of our rural landscape from prehistory to the present day. It will cover many themes such as fiefs, settlement patterns, roads, houses, fields (particularly the enclosure of open fields), banks and trees, mills and churches and will include local peculiarities such as rabbit warrens, fief courts, stone well heads and abreuvoirs.

It is written for the general reader and will be well-illustrated with 90 photographs (85 in colour) and six maps. Publication is expected to take place in August/September and the book will be available from La Société at Candie and Les Sablons and via the website.

SECTION REPORTS Astronomy

The members of the Astronomy Section are pleased to advise that the Observatory is now up and running following the building works completed on the meeting room. To mark this event the members invited our landlords, the members of the Council, and a few other quests together with His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor and Lady Malbon to attend an 'opening' event on Monday 22 March at the Observatory. The event was well attended and despite the weather letting us down, it was a successful evening. We had set up a display and in addition we had astronomical images projected on to the walls, which ran in a cycle during the evening. The press attended and followed it up with a centre page piece about astronomy, which is enjoying a new enthusiasm with the recent Dr Brian Cox series about the solar system. We also met with Radio Guernsey a few days later and they ran a feature on astronomy on 3 April. The building looks really smart. We have acquired some office furniture and have added a ceiling-mounted projector, which has already proved its worth during the Workers Education course we ran in February and March. It will be extremely useful for those visits arranged when the skies are cloudy, as it works with our computer. We are very grateful to our landlords for their generosity in the extensive work carried out.

The end of March and early April had a fine sight in the western evening skies. The brilliant planet Venus was shining brightly in the post sunset sky, a planet that many people will recognise simply because it is so bright, but alongside was the elusive Mercury. Mercury is so close to the sun that there are only a few opportunities in the year when it can be seen, either in the pre-dawn eastern sky or, as was recently the case, the west of the sky as the sun sets. Despite the planet being reasonably bright, it can be difficult to spot, and of course care must be taken if one looks for Mercury before the sun is completely below the horizon. The proximity to Venus made it easy to see this time around. There is many a regular stargazer who has never managed to see Mercury, so if anyone was wondering what the 'star' next to Venus was, you did see something that is not seen easily or often.

We have arranged several open nights during the summer and they will run from 27 July to 31 August on each Tuesday, with a further night on Tuesday 12 October. Additional dates will be advertised as and when they are arranged. For more information please contact Debby Quertier on 725760.

Entomology

Ornithology

The Ornithological Section met for their monthly meeting on the first Thursday in April; however this one was tinged with sadness, as this was Nancy Ogier's final meeting as Section Secretary. She has done a wonderful job during the last six and a half years that she has filled the post.

We could be assured of her quiet efficiency putting together the monthly programme, and chairing with an authority that no doubt stemmed from her years in teaching. We took the opportunity to propose a vote of thanks for her faithful service to the Section, and look forward to her continuing presence in future meetings. We also welcome back Vic Froome, who is returning to the chair after a six year rest.

It was while she was explaining how much easier it is these days to run the Section, with various people doing numerous tasks, that I began to reflect on just what a huge amount of input there is by the sections members. I thought, why wait till people resign to tell them what a great job they are doing. The danger of course is that you miss someone out, if I do then please forgive me, as we are grateful for all that is done. For the size of the Section, there is a huge amount of work that goes on continually.

Every month we have a survey called the Wader Count where Section members each survey a specific area of coastline. The following extract is taken from the Société website.



Ortac Gannets

Known locally as the 'wader counts', these have been a monthly institution since 1979 although technically they cover much more than just waders! Each month, volunteers visit 10 sectors along the Guernsey shore and count all the waders, ducks, geese, gulls and other water birds such as Cormorant and Shag, Kingfisher, Coot and Moorhen. These data are collected as part of the Wetland Bird Survey organised by the British Trust for Ornithology and are collated into annual reports. However the results have provided us with an almost unique dataset allowing us to look at changes over almost 30 years. There are many people to name individually but to make this analysis I would like to thank Wayne Turner, Jen Smart and Mary Simmons for

entering a vast amount of data from paper forms to allow these analyses."

Also going on virtually all year round is bird ringing. This is carried out by our registered bird ringers, particularly Jamie Hooper, Chris Mourant, and Paul Veron, along with a small number who participate from time to time. Together these people annually ring thousands of birds, including the gannet colonies off Alderney (risking life and limb), Jerbourg, Trinity at Pleinmont, Chouet tip, Claire Mare, Rue Des Bergers, just to name a few. It is by such commitment that we know so much more about where a bird goes, how long it lives, etc. All these birds' details have to be recorded, such as ring No., species, age, sex, weight, fat content etc. I'm so pleased I'm not a bird, as my fat content could be a bit on the high side!

All species trapped are listed in great depth in the Transactions. Richmond and Margaret Austin are the ones who compile this, and who submit all the data to the relevant bodies. They have records going back to the 1930's on paper. They are currently looking for willing volunteers to input all this data. Rich did say he has put in 60,000 records this winter alone!



Claire Mare Reserve

Our reserves, which thankfully are growing ever more numerous, have to be monitored. Hides are built, reed beds cut, and paths preserved, or restored, nest boxes put up, scrapes dug, and so much more. Much of this is co-ordinated by Jamie Hooper in his role as MD of Environment Guernsey; however there are still volunteers who turn out when the need arises. Even the likes of our dear Barbara Falla often takes it upon herself to clean out the Vale Pond hide, which sadly is often in a shocking state.

We have our Rarities Committee which meets to consider any species that have been submitted as a record; the members sift through the evidence before deciding whether the record is accepted. This includes Mark Lawlor as our Recorder. In this role he compiles an amazingly complex report on all the birds seen throughout the year, and has faithfully been doing this for a number of years now, and we hope will continue to do so!

Vic Froome continues his mission to give every bird a home, by building Owl boxes (over 500 now!), Kestrel boxes, swift boxes, Sand Martin drums, and who knows what else. I wish I had half his energy and passion. Mary Simmons continues to write up the

monthly meetings minutes. Pauline Chapman ensures that we never run out of money by gathering subs and running the accounts as our Treasurer. Phil Alexander has been co-ordinating the Guernsey part in the huge BTO Bird Atlas initiative, and has made us feel guilty enough to get out there and do some survey work, at least a couple of times a year. He really has worked hard on this.

Phil Atkinson has put a tremendous amount of work into producing the wonderful new Société website, and in particular the birding section, where we can input sightings and photographs directly, and have up to the minute reports of what is about.

Mike Bairds continues every month to produce a wonderful full colour publication called "Guernsey Bird News", wherein all the monthly bird sightings submitted by our members are condensed into species seen, location, when, by whom, and how many! No mean feat given the amount of birds seen in a month.

As you can see there is a lot going on, being ably accomplished by a lot of lovely people, and as I said at the beginning, we want to say thank you to them all for making the Section what it is. There is bound to be somebody that I have forgotten to mention, and if it is you, thank you too for what you do.

Finally after all that, we would be pleased to welcome you to our monthly Section meeting that takes place on the first Thursday of each month at Candie Museum.
