Rock Pool Ramble

On the afternoon of July 23 2012 La Société Guernesiaise provided a guided rock pool ramble at L'Estrainfer next to Cobo beach to 22 members of the 1st Wash Common Cromwell cub scouts.

The ramble began with a talk about the diversity of species and about their distribution on the shore. Crab carapaces, ormer shells and an assortment of other mollusc shells, a cuttlebone, a pink sea fan skeleton, an echinoderm test, and dried bryozoan colonies were passed around the group to show the range of species that they might find on the shore.

The group discovered a large male shore crab, *Carcinus maenas*, reproducing with a soft-shell female of less than half the size. The moulted carapace of the female was still present so it was possible to show the size increase between moults. One of the scouts netted a little cuttlefish, *Sepiola atlantica*, over the sand, which showed off its chromatophores.

The scouts learned about and saw a variety of brown and green algae, beadlet and snakelocks anemones, limpets, topshells, juvenile chancre, broad-claw porcelain crabs, cushion starfish, star ascidians, and a number of gobies. The Scouts asked lots of questions and it was a pleasure to see them enjoying themselves so much.

After an hour and 15 minute rock pool ramble, the cub scouts were eager to jump in the sea for a swim.

Section Reports Archaeology

Archaeologically the last few months have been quiet in Guernsey, however there has been quite a bit going on in the other islands. In June Sir Barry Cunliffe carried out a further season of work in Sark, this year opening an extension to previous trenches in the Tanquerel field.

This is the field where the Sark Hoard was found in the 18th century and is towards the middle of the island close to the mill. The excavations revealed more of the Bronze Age occupation and also some from the Early Iron Age. This area appears to have been a focus for activity of a domestic nature in the Bronze Age / Early Iron Age and then of a ritual nature in the Late Iron Age / early Roman period.

Later in the summer some of the Section joined members of the Alderney Society on excavations at The Nunnery, the fort on the west side of Longis Bay. This project is led by Guernsey Museum Director Jason Monaghan.

The Nunnery is a very complex building; although the fort is almost certainly of Roman build, it has been used and maintained perhaps continuously since that time and there are many phases of archaeology to be seen.

In addition wind-blown sand has raised the level significantly, so it is necessary to dig down a couple of metres to reach the Roman ground level.

This year the work concentrated on the south side of the fort and several structures were unearthed, including a drain beneath the post-medieval south wall and two further walls, one of which may be the foundation for the south wall of the Roman fort (the upper part of which is now collapsed onto the beach below).

Work on the skeletons from the cemetery at St Tugual's Chapel in Herm is now almost complete. Early last year around forty skeletons were uncovered during conservation works to the chapel. And about twenty of these were excavated because they were in the path of a drainage scheme.

These are currently being studied by local osteoarchaeologist, Jenny Cataroche. The condition of the bone is generally good and she should be able to determine the age, sometimes the sex and perhaps also to comment on the health of the individuals.

Radiocarbon dates will be obtained from small samples and this will tell us the time of death; a range of dates would indicate the length of time that this part of the cemetery was in use. It is thought that the burials are medieval - a time about which little is known of Herm; hopefully as the results emerge, much more will be added to our knowledge of the island's population at this time.

In June there was a very exciting discovery in Jersey: two local metal detectorists found a massive hoard of Celtic coins, mainly in silver and numbering into tens of thousands. There are other objects within the hoard, some of which are gold. Because of its size the hoard had to be removed from the field in a block of earth, which will now be carefully taken apart under laboratory conditions.

Guernsey States Archaeologist Philip de Jersey is an expert on Celtic coins and was involved with the excavation of the hoard; he will continue to assist in the interpretation as the hoard is dismantled. Philip kindly gave a lecture for La Societe on the discovery and it will be fascinating to follow the progress as events unfold.

Finally, in July some of the Section visited an island even further afield – South Uist in the Outer Hebrides. This was to assist with the excavation of an Early Neolithic settlement which is being badly eroded by the sea. The connection with Guernsey is that this work is part of a wider project looking at the settlement of islands in this very early period of prehistory; the time when people first began to settle and farm the land.

The excavations at L'Eree which have taken place in recent years are part of the same project and were carried out by the same team of archaeologists.

Anyone wishing to join the Section should contact the secretary and will receive regular updates on the various projects and lectures. There are also opportunities to get involved with excavation and finds processing.

Astronomy

This year, 2012, is our 40th anniversary. We celebrated with three high profile talks which took place during April and May. The first was given by our founder Dr David Falla FRAS. David talked of the advances made in astronomy during the last fifty years due to the improvements in scientific and observational techniques in which he has been involved.

Dr Christopher Riley was a visiting Professor from Lincoln University. He has worked for twelve years on the substantial film archives held by NASA and gave us a very interesting and often amusing presentation on his use of these footings, for the many documentaries he has produced for BBC television.

The third speaker was Jurat and astronomer David Le Conte FRAS. David spoke in great detail of the many Guernsey astronomers, both past and present over the last 200 years. David also shared with us his own experiences working on the 1960s space programme.

These talks had been arranged by David Le Conte. They were held and well represented at the Frossard Centre Candie Gardens. They coincided with a splendid exhibition staged by Jason Monaghan at the Museum and Art gallery, of photographs created by NASA.

Wednesday 6 June was the day the planet Venus crossed over the face of the sun, known as the transit of Venus. Actually it was in the morning at 5.05 am.

One of our larger telescopes had been loaded in my car the day before and we had it set up at Bordeaux before 5.00 am, complete with the sun protection. Eight of us were there but the sun was not. The clouds just would not go away.

But it was extremely pleasant. It had been a social gathering and the early morning view of Herm and Sark were superb.

Saturday 11 August was the night of the Perseids meteor storm. This is the evening when we enjoy a barbeque at the observatory and when it gets dark we settle down to watch the display. Well the barbeque was excellent, but the clouds would once more not go away. But just like the transit of Venus, it was an excellent occasion. On neither occasion did it rain so once again a social gathering was enjoyed by all.

The Friends of the Priaulx library

Guernsey's Generals of the 19th Century

The latest Newsletter from the Friends of the Priaulx Library majors on two stories about Guernsey's famous Generals of the 19th century, namely Major General Sir Isaac Brock written by Olly Brock and Major General John Gaspard le Marchant written by the Joint Services Command and Staff College Library.

Both were born in the mid eighteenth century and both died in battle in two different theatres of war in 1812.

Brock was 43 when he died at Queenston Heights on the 13 October 1812 and is a Hero of Upper Canada. The bicentenary of his death will be remembered in Canada with many events.

The Guernsey Brock Bicentenary Committee of John Silvester, Evan Ozanne and Olly Brock will also be organising three main events on Guernsey to commemorate Brock's death.

Gaspard Le Marchant was 46 when he was killed at the battle of Salamanca on the 2 July 1812. He was one of the finest cavalry Generals of his generation and established the Royal Military Academy at High Wycombe and Harlow that eventually became Sandhurst.
